History 2174B Hockey Overtime Winter 2026

Course Description

This course examines the history of hockey in Canada from its origins to the present day. While the course studies hockey, it does so through more than a sporting lens. It examines the importance and development of sport as a source of leisure and physical exercise, a means of social control, indoctrination, and citizenship, and as an expression of community, provincial, regional, and national identity. By examining the story of hockey in Canada over time, it analyzes such issues as the origins and development of the sport, its importance in a northern, wintery climate, the rise of professionalism, and the role of gender, race, ethnicity, class, sexuality, region, and the powerful association with nationalism and national identity.

Learning Objectives

By the course's completion, students will be able to

- Identify key themes and developments in the history of hockey in Canada,
- Relate contemporary issues in Canadian hockey to their historical developments,
- Analyze the impact of gender, race/ethnicity, class, and sexuality on hockey in Canada,
- Understand and explain hockey's role in Canadian nationalism and on Canadian culture
- Articulate, evaluate, and defend historical arguments and interpretations of hockey in Canada

Methods of Evaluation

Mid-term= 40%

Final Exam= 60%

There are two examinations in this course. The exams are designed to be answered in essay format. Students must complete both examinations in order to pass the course.
