COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course surveys cultural, social, economic and political themes in the history of Europe from the mid-15th century to the early 17th century. Topics will include the Renaissance-era revival of classical art and culture; Protestant and Catholic religious reformations; the early development of nation states; European discovery of the Americas; and the challenges of everyday life.

COURSE SYLLABUS

In this class students will build the following competencies and skills:

- 1. Identify and describe key events and concepts in early modern European history
- 2. Evaluate diverse forms of historical evidence and cultivate interpretive skills
- 3. Strengthen writing skills in history and related disciplines
- 4. Engage with faculty and peers in a collaborative, respectful atmosphere

Students must submit all written assignments and complete the final exam to pass the course. Students are expected to attend class and seminar meetings throughout the term and to prepare for the discussions and other activities.
