COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course investigates the social and cultural changes that flowed from contact between American, African and European peoples from the mid-15th to the later 17th centuries. Topics will include the initial conflicts among Europeans and Indigenous societies in Meso-America; the far-reaching demographic impact of intercontinental contact; the formation of Atlantic economic patterns often rooted in forced labor; and the reciprocal cultural impact of Atlantic encounters.

COURSE SYLLABUS

Students will build the following competencies and skills:

- Understand key events and concepts in the history of the Atlantic World.
- Consider the diverse relationships among European, Indigenous and African peoples in the Americas and elsewhere.
- Evaluate diverse forms of historical evidence and cultivate interpretive skills.
- Strengthen analytical writing skills for history and related disciplines.
- Engage with faculty and peers in a collaborative, respectful and stimulating environment.
